## Siliguri to Sonada up the Hillcart Road... Reminiscences of a Second Generation SCS-ian... Series1

Let us take the average age of a generation, before the next is born, to be 30 years.

I belong to the 2-G spectrum who had a chance to listen to the first gen Sonadians and is now privileged to bore you the 3-G Sonadians with some uninteresting things, for a start (or for the end...).

The first one to come and speak to us of SCS was Rev. Mariano Uguet, a Spaniard Don Bosco priest who paid for and bought the Whiteman's House (Gora Bari) in 1938. The lower part of SCS adjoining the road down was the Whiteman's stable and the wooden house above in which the white man/men lived (their women too I suppose) became the kitchen, infirmary and music practising room upto the years 1982–83 after which they were torn down by the efforts of Rev. M. D. George to make it into the present grand chapel. When I completed my BA-English and BA-Philosophy in 1985, the old main building had an upper floor and the chapel was half way through....

It was interesting that Rev. Nicholas LoGroi, the Italian youngster who joined there as a seminarian, became a priest in charge of the students, then he became the Rector, then a Novice Master in Shillong and then the Provincial of Calcutta and once again the Rector when we were there.... and no one complained about the chilblains in the rather severe winter... or of Gorabari being a hopeless place especially in comparison with the warm St. Mary's Hill of Kurseong...

A person much endeared to the locals of Sonada and Gorabari was Sotto Father, Rev. Guiseppe Verzotto, who was the point of contact for the social work wing of SCS including the postal service in Gorabari village. He had his allopathic medicines for almost all the ailments of the people around in a clandestine way with the help of expert pharmacists and male nurses recruited even from the brothers who joined the college for the first year..!

An enigmatic disciple of the Christ was Rev. Luigi Jellici (Yellichi) who had the audacity to take me a second year student to walk all the way down to Balasun valley, made me read the Second Reading for the Church Service in Nepali and also made me give a short sermon in Nepali (and at the end added that it was too short and I should make it slightly longer the next time)! After lunch, he made me climb another 25 km up to Mirik (the second longest walk in my life in one day -55 km!) and after reaching there he made me put the rather warm attic of Don Bosco House in order for 2 hours and sleep there for 6 hours after which he woke me up at 5:00 am before the sun woke up...!

About the next write up in the series of my reminiscences about our studies and extracurricular

activities, I hope to pen in my next series...

(Post Script: after 3 years, I came back to S.C. Sonada to take part in the golden jubilee of SCS in 1988, as a Station Master in the Southern Railway, of Erode Jn. and then of Ooty (in TN) and I felt duty bound to give my first salary to my Alma Mater (SCS) which made me what I was then and what am now....)
